MAY UNITS **Topic: Domestic Violence**

One of the most persistent crimes today is violence or other abuse by one person against another in a domestic setting. Up

to the mid-1800s, with few exceptions, it was mostly legal for a husband to beat his wife as a form of authority over her. Starting in the 1990s, statistics on incidents of domestic violence helped raise awareness and the public and criminal justice system began to view family violence as a crime rather than a family matter.

Today there are laws on the books, police departments have procedures and victims can obtain orders for protection and restraining orders, yet police are spending a lot of time on domestic calls.

Our unit meetings in May will explore how the crime of domestic violence is handled by our local police. What is the extent of domestic violence? What do local police policies say? What happens when someone calls 9-1-1 about domestic violence? How do police and other agencies work together?



The Power and Control grid illustration was developed by the Domestic Abuse Intervention Program (DAIP) in Duluth. They listened to the stories of victims, and documented the most common abusive behaviors or tactics that were used against these women. The tactics chosen for the wheel were those that were most universally experienced by battered women.

Our guest speakers, Jennifer Bloom and Jessica Ellison, led us in group activity where we listed what we thought every citizen should know, do, and believe about government; then we ranked the three most important things from each list. Ms. Bloom pointed out that no one mentioned "run for public office," as one of the important things we can and should do about government. We also learned about the current social studies standards being taught in schools including civic skills, and about current bills in the legislature this session

This convention was extra special because it marked the 100th anniversary of the founding of the League of Women Voters Minnesota! Six delegates from the White Bear Lake Area LWV represented us at the convention. They were: Carol Bergeson (North Oaks unit), Mary Santi (White Bear Lake unit), Miriam Simmons (St. Croix Valley unit), Laurie Boche (Mahtomedi unit), Lisa Larson (Mahtomedi unit), and Kathy Tomsich(North Oaks unit). This has caused some frustration and confusion because Lobby Corps members (who are trained and empowered to lobby legislators on behalf of LWV Minnesota) have not been able to use a position from which to advocate for the bills on civics education that have been introduced this year. Lemon Chicken Orzo Soup

Ingredients

- 8 ounces orzo pasta
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 3 carrots, chopped, or more to taste
- 3 ribs celery, chopped
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- salt and ground black pepper to taste
- 1 bay leaf
- 3 (32 ounce) cartons fat-free, low-sodium chicken broth
- 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice
- 1 lemon, zested
- 8 ounces cooked chicken breast, chopped
- 1 (8 ounce) package baby spinach leaves
- 1 lemon, sliced for garnish (optional)
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese (optional)

Directions

- 1. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook orzo in the boiling water until partially cooked through but not yet soft, about 5 minutes; drain and rinse with cold water until cooled completely.
- 2. Heat olive oil in a large pot over medium heat. Cook and stir carrots, celery, and onion in hot oil until the vegetables begin to soften and the onion becomes translucent, 5 to 7 minutes. Add garlic; cook and stir until fragrant, about 1 minute more. Season mixture with thyme, oregano, salt, black pepper, and bay leaf; continue cooking another 30 seconds before pouring chicken broth into the pot.
- 3. Bring the broth to a boil. Partially cover the pot, reduce heat to medium-low, and simmer until the vegetables are just tender, about 10 minutes.
- 4. Stir orzo, lemon juice, and lemon zest into the broth; add chicken. Cook until the chicken and orzo are heated through, about 5 minutes. Add baby spinach; cook until the spinach wilts into the broth and the orzo is tender, 2 to 3 minutes. Ladle soup into bowls; garnish with lemon slices and Parmesan cheese.

Kale, Turnip, and Turkey Sausage Soup

Total time 25 mins. Yield: 8 cups.

Ingredients

- 5 uncooked mild Italian turkey sausages (500 g)
- 1/2 a bunch of kale leaves, chopped about 3-4 leaves
- 2 cups turnip, peeled and chopped
- 1 cup onion, chopped
- 1 cup carrot, chopped
- 2 cups low sodium chicken broth
- 1 cup water
- 1 tsp thyme (dried)

Instructions

- 1. In a large soup pot, heat to medium high heat.
- 2. Remove the raw sausage from its casing and put into the pot. Breaking it up with a <u>wooden spoon</u> or potato masher.
- 3. Once the sausage is about $\frac{1}{2}$ cooked, add in the onion, turnip and carrot and thyme and cook until the vegetables begin to soften (about 5-7 minutes).
- 4. Then add in the chicken broth and water.
- 5. Cover and simmer until the vegetables are completely soft (another 10 minutes or so). When there's about 5 minutes left in cooking, add the chopped kale (remember to strip it from the stem)
